We hope to see you on the courts at CAPA events this summer!





Becoming a Pickleball Referee

I started my journey about 12 months ago after playing Pickleball for about 18 months. I officiate other sports and thought that adding Pickleball officiating would add to my enjoyment of the sport. Here are the steps that I have taken and will take to complete my journey:

- 1. You must be a USAPA member, and at least 16 years old.
- 2. Complete a referee training class conducted by a USA Pickleball registered referee trainer. This curriculum should include line judge training. The course can be Online video training and/or classroom PowerPoint training. (Utilize the training materials found on the <u>USAPA website</u>)
- 3. Contact your regional Referee Training Coordinator (RTC) to find a trainer. (Wisconsin does not have a resident trainer).
- 4. Attend and watch Pickleball games from a referee perspective (At the net).
- 5. Purchase or download the tools needed to officiate (Clipboard, clips, stopwatch, tape measure, score sheets)
- 6. Practice keeping score in rec-play games.
- 7. Volunteer to officiate local rec-play games, with all levels of skill players.
- 8. Search out sanctioned tournaments and contact the head referee and referee coordinator to schedule shadow opportunities and possible refereeing opportunities.
- 9. Practice, practice, practice.
- 10. Attend a sanctioned tournament to be assessed for Level 1 credentialing (usually within 3-6 months after starting the process).
- 11. After receiving Level 1 credentials, attend additional tournaments to build experience/confidence in officiating.
- 12. Work with RTC to improve skills.
- 13. After over 100 matches, apply to be assessed for Level 2 credentialing. (6-9 months after Level 1).
- 14. After receiving Level 2 credentials, ask for mentor/trainer to work on advanced skills.
- 15. Complete the Advanced Training Skills (ATS) with mentor and apply for assessment to become Certified Referee (6-12 months after Level 2).

Even though it may seem like it takes a long period of time to complete all the steps, this is actually a shorter time frame than it has taken in other sports. The 3 other sports that I have credentials for have taken between 3-5 years to attain the highest level of certification. The Pickleball refereeing process is well documented and could be achieved within two years. Etiquette Corner

To Rule or Not To Rule?



It never fails to amaze me how, for such a relatively simple game, so many Pickleball players just don't know some of the basic rules. Beginners I can understand; the whole idea of the no volley zone is weird and takes some getting used to. What bothers me are the seasoned players who either don't know, or flout, the rules.

Some rules are inviolate, such as the NVZ and the two bounce rule. But others seem more flexible, which is probably good because they are frequently ignored. I see the volley-serve rules frequently ignored. Beginners and pros alike, it seems, serve side-arm, or with the paddle higher than their wrist. (It also doesn't help that in a non-officiated game, the remedy for these rule violations is... nothing [4.A.9.a])

This raises the question of whether or not you should call out an opponent if they clearly violate a rule. I've written before about being careful to avoid alienating others over what is supposed to be a recreational pursuit. My own guideline in these matters is "no harm, no foul." If your opponent steps just over the line during a serve, is it worth calling a fault? Or if someone accidentally touches the net while rushing in to get a dink?

On the other hand, some faults are almost automatically impactful on the game and must be called. In addition to NVZ and the two-bounce rules mentioned earlier, I think we could add instances where the ball touches a player, or errors with servers and receivers being in their correct positions. I'm sure you can think of more.

If you do feel compelled to point out an ongoing issue with someone's play, you might want to wait until the end of the game and then frame the issue as one of suggesting that you are pretty sure they didn't mean to intentionally break a rule.

And of course these suggestions only apply in recreational games. If you are playing in a tournament or league, you are entitled to call any infraction to your advantage. Just remember...your opponent is watching you, too.

Pickleball Rules Update


I often get asked what faults can be called when you are playing non-officiated or recreation play.

Here are the ones that can be called when you are playing:

- Receivers may call a service foot fault on the server.
- Players may call a non-volley zone (NVZ or kitchen) foot fault on their opponents.

In both of these cases, the offending player could dispute the call which would result in a re-serve or re-play.

Other faults during play can be identified after the rally has ended, but unless the offending player agrees, there is no recourse other than a replay. This can lead to multiple re-plays if the offending player does not acknowledge their fault. This is especially true on serves, when a player may serve illegally (see October newsletter). There are a number of conditions on the serve where there is no recourse for the receiver, but in the spirit of good sportsmanship, hopefully

we all try to follow the rules, and if we don't know the rules, should seek out someone with knowledge of the rules (experienced players or referees).

Here are the rules associated with non-officiated play.

Rule 4.A.6. In matches without a referee, the server's release of the ball must be visible to the receiver. There is no fault if the release is not visible to the referee or receiver.

Rule 4.A.9. In non-officiated matches, if the receiver determines that manipulation of spin has been imparted prior to the serve, or the release of the ball is not visible, the receiver may call for a replay before the return of serve. In non-officiated matches, the receiver has no authority to call for replays or faults for service motion violations.

Rule 13.D.1.c. Players may call non-volley zone and service foot faults on the opponent's end of the court. If there is any disagreement among players about the called foot fault, a replay shall occur.

Rule 13.D.1.d. For non-officiated matches, if a player believes an opponent has committed any type of fault other than a service or non-volley zone foot fault as noted in Section 7, Fault Rules, they may mention the specific fault to the opponent(s) but they have no authority to enforce the fault. The final decision on fault resolution belongs to the player that allegedly committed the fault.




Events Committee
